NSNA 58th Annual Convention Orlando, Florida

Upon arrival in Orlando I had no idea what to expect for my first student nurse's convention. I stepped off the plane, and made my way over to a bus ride that was provided from the airport to the resort. I was one of the last passengers to board the bus so I tossed my luggage to the bus driver in a hurry and stepped aboard. There I stood in the front of the bus looking down the aisle in amazement at all of the student nurses from all over the country smiling right back at me. I made my way about half way down the bus and found the one empty seat left. A friendly fellow nursing student from New York greeted me with a friendly hello and asked me where I was from. We talked and laughed the entire bus ride. This set the precedence for the underlying bond that I felt all of the nursing students had. Even though we were from different corners of the country, we all had the same goal and passion of wanting to help people. Here at the conference was the perfect spot to gather all the resources we needed.

Wednesday I attended the opening ceremonies, which started off with an amazing version of the National Anthem sung by a fellow nursing student Latricia Burwell from Chicago, IL. I felt like I was at American Idol for a few minutes! An announcement was made that there were over 2,400 NSNA members registered at that time and they expected even more tomorrow! The Spirit of Nursing award was presented, sponsors were recognized, and videos were shown from Johnson and Johnson's campaign for Nursing's future. These videos are put together by nurses and fellow nursing students and submitted. You can find some of these on You-Tube. The two they showed were absolutely hilarious! Later in the evening, the "First Night Party" was in full effect. The theme was "Magic and Make Believe" there was several Disney Princess costumes, karaoke, desserts, dancing and great music.

Thursday morning I made my way over to the exhibit hall and career counseling center grand opening. Once again, I stood in the doorway amazed by the size of this exhibit hall and all the different professional associations to get involved in. The first booth I stopped at was for the Emergency Nurses Association. I was so excited; I know that I want to do emergency nursing so this was "the spot" I was looking for. The nurse was full of information and let me ask as many questions as I could think of. She informed me that I didn't have to wait to pass my NCLEX to join. She gave me an application and gave me a sample of their monthly journal with a variety of topics and scenarios such as; what is a triage nurse, ectopic pregnancy, when your pediatric patient becomes a crime scene, the older adult in the ED and Lawn Mower Injuries. I couldn't believe how many vendors were interested in our opinions. Another student told me that she received a free pair of Dansko nursing shoes just for wearing the shoes and a Dansko t-shirt around the exhibit hall and reporting her opinions back. Littman Stethoscopes offered a \$75.00 gift certificate for 75 minutes of your time and giving them input for product research. I had so many gadgets, pens, DVD's and booklets full of resources and topics I was interested in that I

couldn't fit all of them into my suitcase. There were multiple vendors selling books, flip charts, and DVD's for a variety of different learning styles whether you're a visual learner or an audio learner. My favorite is a book by Loretta Manning and Sylvia Rayfield called "Pharmacology Made INSANELY Easy!" which was also a focus session we attended? This amazing book gives you songs and characters to memorize pharmacology basics. Such as "CEF the Giant" in relation to Cephalosporin which is a big, powerful antibiotic. He can also produce GIANT (undesirable effects.)

G= GI nausea, vomiting, diarrhea

I= Increase in glucose values

A= Anaphylaxis may occur (alcohol may cause vomiting)

N = Nephrotoxicity

T= Thrombocytopenia

There were multiple colleges that offered online classes, which were very flexible to continue your nursing education. Everyday a variety of focus sessions were offered during the week such as Career fitness, How to land the right job, Test taking strategies, Successful writing, Leadership, The reality of emergency nursing, Put more power in your memory, Acing nursing school exams, Documentation, Avoiding malpractice and my favorite, Pharmacology Made Extremely Easy. The American Red Cross offered a plenary session: "When Disaster Strikes – what will your role be as a student nurse?" A class certificate was provided for this session. Pre-registration was required for this class. It was so popular it filled up quickly and I was not able to attend this one. I highly recommend finding out what sessions are being offered at the next convention and registering early! Another session that filled up quickly was the Drexel University NCLEX EXCEL mini review. This was an 8-hour review course spread across 3 days of NCLEX preparation.

The House of Delegates was held throughout the week. Election candidates battled it out at the presidential presentation and debate. Watching the structure of the debates was a new, exciting experience for me. Resolution hearings and voting about a wide variety of topics such as; Increased awareness of bone marrow screening and donations, Advocacy for nurse home visits to first-time, low-income mothers, and More recess time for elementary-aged students, especially those with attention deficit disorder/attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADD/ADHD)

Closing ceremonies was held on Saturday evening. Endnote professional speaker Corey Ciocchetti gave a motivational presentation asking us to take the "Integrity Challenge." Inspiring us to chase the important things in life such as solid character, strong personal relationships, and a sense of contentment. The evening closed with the 2010-2011 Board of Directors and Nominating and Elections Committee and top NSNA award presentations.

I would like to thank SNO, Riverside Community College and especially Wilma LaCava for supporting me in attending this new and exciting opportunity to add to my journey of becoming a Registered Nurse.
