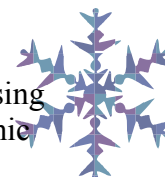

Message from the Dean

“The RCC School of Nursing is committed to advancing the art and science of nursing by empowering graduates to value scholarship, lifelong learning and leadership in a dynamic healthcare environment.”



Recently, the RCC faculty adopted this Vision for our nursing program. Along with that Vision, the faculty has developed a set of Values, Goals, Philosophy, and Foundational Concepts and Sub-concepts that will anchor and flow throughout the new curriculum the faculty is developing. Although the entire new curriculum will not be implemented for another year and a half, you as nursing students will begin to hear more about some of these concepts in the coming semesters. For example, “informatics” involves the use of technology and information systems in the direct provision of patient care, managing and delivery educational experiences, enhancing lifelong learning and supporting nursing research. Computers, Nurse Squared, and Simulation scenarios are three examples of how we use informatics in our nursing programs.

The next couple of years will be challenging ones for all of us! Community college tuition rates will most likely rise to \$40/unit; clinical facilities continue to require additional and costly information such as Background Checks/Drug Screens; and cuts throughout the college will mean decreases in available clerical help, supplies for labs, etc. It is concerning to say the least. Rest assured, we are trying to keep your costs down as much as we are able without negatively impacting your education. Every week the office receives student scholarships/grants—be sure to check your student and SNO bulletin boards for the latest opportunities. Keep your eyes focused on the goal of the well-paying jobs you will be eligible for at the end of your program!

Thanks to all who attended Deans' Council—Dr. Howard and I appreciate your feedback! It was refreshing to hear of students' high regard for the outstanding education they are receiving at RCC.
